Friends,

The end of October has become dominated by Halloween. It's fun to make our homes look like haunted houses, and for kids to dress up in costumes and get free candy from their neighbors. But the church's meaning for this time seems to have gotten lost in all this spooky festivity. "Halloween", after all, is just a contraction of "All Hallow's Eve", the night before All Saints' Day. For centuries, this was a much more important day on the church calendar than it is now. November 1st is the day when the church remembers Christians who have passed away during the previous year.

O blest communion, Fellowship divine! We feebly struggle, They in glory shine; All are one in Thee, For all are Thine. Alleluia, Alleluia!

I'm afraid that the spirit of Halloween comes closer to describing how we think about death than All Saints' Day does. Even faithful Christians who have received the promise of resurrection in Christ still try to avoid thinking of our own death, or the loss of someone we love. And when we do, we may only imagine chilling visions of graveyards and skeletons.

But part of what our faith in Jesus should give us is an entirely different attitude toward death. Through Jesus, the end of life isn't really the end, but a new beginning. While we mourn the loss of those we love, we have that assurance that they live on in God's eternal, loving presence, just as we will one day.

O may Thy soldiers, Faithful, true and bold, Fight as the saints Who nobly fought of old, And win with them The victor's crown of gold. Alleluia, Alleluia!

W. W. How's glorious hymn "For All the Saints" was written to help us look past death and see instead what lies beyond for Christians. It is rest after a lifetime of work and struggle. It is relief from every pain or loss we ever suffered; every tear we ever shed. It is the reward of the crown of victory for everyone who has defended their faith to the end. It is the fulfillment of God's covenant, made to us at our baptism. It is the communion that comes from being united forever with Christ and everyone else who put their faith in Christ. It is light and music and glory and peace and so much more. Halloween only tells us that death is something frightening. But All Saints' Day tells us that it is a gateway to eternal life, given to us by the One who loves us. Alleluia!

New Giving Portal now available to electronically gift money to the Church!

The members of the Finance Commission are pleased to offer a new giving portal that will allow the congregation to gift money to the Church at their convenience, versus writing a check and waiting for Sunday to place it in the Offering Plate. Provided in conjunction with our banking partners at Security National Bank, it is a safe, efficient, and easy way to offer your financial support to the Church.

To use the giving portal, do the following...

go to our website at www.1st-PresbyterianChurch.org

• At the top of the webpage, click on "Giving"

Next, click on the green box that says "Donate to the First Presbyterian Church"

You will be automatically connected to the giving portal.

- Choose your payment option, either a major credit card or checking account
- Enter your donation amount, your name, email, phone number and home address
- Enter your credit card or bank account information
- Under memo, you can designate the funds if you so wish (normal offering, a memorial, a gift to music, buildings and grounds, missions, etc.)
- Hit "Continue"

You will now be taken to a page to confirm your information. Once you agree that all information is correct, click on "Authorize Payment"

That's it! You will receive an email confirmation of the amount you gifted and that the payment has been received. Payments are normally deposited into the Church checking account within 24 -48 hours upon gifting. STEWARDSHIP

Good morning,

I was asked by Pastor Bedford to do today's stewardship remarks. I have given much thought into what to say. It is difficult to figure out the right thing to say; however, I hope I can relate the right tone and substance as we are faced with an exceedingly difficult challenge. Over the past few years, we have had decreasing pledges mostly relating to the decreased size of the congregation. If this continues, it will challenge our future existence. Fortunately, it is not too late to address this challenge. Fortunately, First Presbyterian Church is worth saving and we have the tools to do so.

165 years ago First Presbyterian Church was established in Sioux City. Since that time, we have spread God's message to thousands of people. We now are faced with a difficult time for our church and churches across the nation and the world. The rise of unchurched believers, those with no particular religion, and nonbeliever's is the challenge of our age. Yet humanity yearns for a purpose and the need of living life in a way that fulfills. We are here because we believe Christianity leads to happy, successful living, just as early Christians called it "The Way".... a way to satisfy those ageless desires and needs of humanity. It is a way of living that teaches us to focus on others and our relationship with God, not on ourselves.

First Presbyterian Church is uniquely positioned in the community. Daily, thousands of people drive by our church. We are blessed by visibility and beauty. Pipe Organ Update

On March 14, 2022, Mary Benton contacted Nordlie Pipe Organ Company out of Sioux Falls to tune and make repairs to the organ. Our previous pipe organ maintenance company, Darrow Pipe Organ LLC, informed us earlier this year that they no longer service organs, due to worker shortage and transfer or owners. Nordlie is a family-owned, three-generation company that has been in business since 1976. It has a good reputation and strong history of creating, assembling, installing, and maintaining large pipe organs throughout the four-state region.

As the Nordlie team began their routine maintenance work in July, they noticed signs of severe moisture damage in the two main organ chambers, including surface rust on the interior screws, the paper valve system that is secured by water-based fish glue in the 4 stop Pitman windchest in the Great division had separated rendering the great mixture inoperable, and puddles of rust in the metal wind trunks.

The cause of this damage was determined to be from two sources. First, a steam line burst in one of the adjoining rooms to the organ chamber would have introduced water into the main organ chambers. Second, the humidification system installed on the organ was installed with the humidistat (a gauge which measures and regulates the humidity) in the organ chamber. Ideally the humidistat should be located within the organ wind system. The humidifier itself is located in the blower room, and when the organ is running it is pulling damp air into the organ. With the humidistat in the chamber, it cannot gauge the humidity inside the organ, and will continue adding moisture regardless of the actual humidity.

The decision was made to move forward with these repairs, knowing that more damage would be found and restoration required related to the moisture issue, the age of the instrument, and the manner in which the organ was rebuilt in the 1990's due to the repairs and restoration not completed in full order due to that organ company, based in New Jersey, filing bankruptcy.

After identifying the damage in two primary reservoirs, Nordlie checked the remaining chambers in the organ and found similar moisture damage situations-leather releasing from the ribs, and surface rust on interior screws. They advised that it would be prudent to pull all of the reservoirs and complete the repairs at the same time, to which we agreed. In addition, the tilting tabs that control the coupler actions had to be repaired or replaced. Nordlie also addressed the stop and combination actions, the digital stops from Walker Technical, and final tuning, as well deciphering how best to program the humidifier controls.

Mary reported that combination action has not been working for some time, and Nordlie shared that the Peterson stop action magnets (SAMs) were failing. The SAM is an electro-magnet that drives the stop-knob in and out when using the combination action. It also sends a signal into the organ to turn the stops on at the wind chest. After going through the SAM's of the Pedal division Nordlie found that about half of magnets were failing due to poor design, which tends to result in internal parts of the SAM dragging, and the remaining SAM's appeared to be worn out due to excessive amperage from the Peterson control system. Unfortunately, Peterson does not make this model of SAM anymore. Their recommendation was to replace the Peterson SAM's with a product from Syndyne. With this replacement, all of the existing drawknobs and woodwork of the console could be retained, which are also rated for higher amperage than the Peterson units so that the wearing out that has caused the other SAM's to fail will not occur in the future.

The final tuning and repairs were completed on September 22, and the organ was once again playable for worship service on September 25. The new Syndyne SAM unit is on back-order and final delivery could be as much as 20 weeks out due to supply chain issues. The back-order will push this part of the organ repair back to the New Year. However, the organ can be played with the current components in place until the new component arrives in early 2023.

With the repairs and restoration work completed (including the Syndyne unit installation when it is received), the total expense will be \$103,400. At this point, we will be paying for these repairs out of our capital reserves, which is becoming depleted with other large building projects that have needed to be completed over the past three years. We have submitted a claim to our insurance company to request that some of these costs be covered under our policy. The assessment will likely take several months before we receive a decision.

The good news is that the organ should be a good working order for the next few years (likely 5-10 years, but could be sooner), and that much of the component repair work completed could be applied towards a total organ rebuild in the future. However, Nordlie has shared that, with the moisture damage caused and the age of the instrument, we will likely need to totally rebuild and refurbish the organ during this time period. The cost is estimated to be \$750,000 - \$1,000,000, depending upon inflation and parts availability when the project is started.

The Session will seek input from the church congregation over the next few months regarding how best to proceed with a full rebuild, and if approved, how best to pay/fundraise for this expense. We have a few years before we are faced with this decision, but it would be prudent to begin deliberations and planning now.
