Friends,

During the Cold War, a horrific joke arose. "Nuke them all! Let God sort them out!" This dark humor expressed the lack of value for life that had developed. In such times, it became more difficult to find compassion for those in need.

As Jesus went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd...

from Mark 6:34

I bring this up because, as Christians, we are constantly faced with opportunities to help. Whether the plea comes via e-mail or from a cardboard sign on an exit ramp, we continually have to make decisions about how to show our Christian compassion. And unfortunately, that's where our excuses come in.

...his disciples came to him and said, 'This is a deserted place, and the hour is now very late; send them away so that they may go...and buy something for themselves to eat.'

from Mark 6:35-36

But such excuses don't leave room for grace. Our faith in Jesus isn't based on what we've done to deserve the salvation that Jesus offers us all. It's based on the fact that Jesus offers us that salvation when NONE of us deserve it. Salvation in Christ is a gift, freely given to anyone humble enough to admit that they need it and can't get it for themselves.

Our works of charity shouldn't be any different. If we make people prove themselves worthy before we treat them with kindness, then we are not showing them the grace that Christ has already shown us. Instead, Christ calls us to give freely, without suspicion or judgment. Jesus lived out this example in the feeding of the 5000.

Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to his disciples to set before the people; and he divided the two fish among them all. And all ate and were filled.

from Mark 6:41-42

- No judgment on whether they'd worked hard enough to deserve a meal. No suspicion about whether the food would go to good use. Just Jesus' grace-filled, compassionate willingness to give what he had to people who needed it.
- During our worship services in January and February, we'll get the chance to meet representatives from charitable organizations all over Siouxland. We'll learn more about what they do for people in need, and how we, as individuals and as a congregation, can help them in their missions. And I hope that we'll all learn that our job as Christians isn't to judge who is worthy of compassion or charity. Our job is simply to reflect the grace that Jesus has shown to us. We do this by taking what God has blessed us with and using it to bless others in turn. If someone is hungry and we have food, we feed them. If someone is cold and we have a jacket, we give it to them.

Love them all. Let God sort them out.

The Sioux City Residential Facilities (RTF) are designed to provide monitored, live-in supervision for high risk clients in need of structure and stability (housing, budgeting, employment), assistance in re-entry from prison, or as an alternative for incarceration in prison or jail.

Residents progress through the phase system by obtaining and maintaining full-time employment, attending treatment as ordered or deemed appropriate through assessments, meeting financial responsibilities, refraining from drug and alcohol

abuse, and displaying pro-social behavior in the facility and community.

Market Update

As we inch closer to the Holiday season, it is safe to say that 2022 has been everything but a gift. It has been a challenging year for investors as stubborn inflation continues to weigh on the global financial markets. To combat these measures, the Federal Reserve (Fed) has significantly raised interest rates to ease rising prices seen throughout the economy. In turn, both the bond and equity markets have been adversely effected. Through the end of the 3rd quarter, year to date performance for the First Presbyterian Church Agency declined 19.9%. However, the portfolio has rebounded nicely throughout the 4th quarter; down 12.1% through the end of November.

As we are closing in on the year, there is light at the end of the tunnel. We are starting to see inflation gradually decline after reaching its peak in June. While the Fed remains committed to fighting inflation, they have signaled that smaller interest rate hikes could start soon. The labor market has continued to thrive throughout the year with jobless claims remaining near historic lows.

Looking into the new year, we are comfortable with how the portfolio is positioned. The value tilt towards stocks and shorter term maturities in bonds has helped mitigate losses during these challenging times. Since inception of management in February of 2012, the portfolio assets have produced a rate of return of 5.15% annually after management fees.

Estate Planning Tip

The Sandwich Generation

The Sandwich Generation is defined as adults providing care and financial support to both their elderly parents and their own young adult children and are therefore "sandwiched" in the middle. Future demographics show that by 2030, all of the estimated 73 million baby boomers will be at least 65 years old. Statistics also show Millennials make up 1/3 of sandwich providers and those numbers will only continue to grow given that they are the largest generation.

Other data from the Pew Research Center show:

60% of sandwich generation caregivers are women

32% of adults in their 40s and 50s provide financial help to a parent

73% of adults in their 40s and 50s provide some financial support to at least one grown child, with 27% proving to be the primary support

In addition to the financial support, the sandwiched generation is finding they are rushed and pressed for time, sleeping a half-hour less and having less time for work

If you are the person being "sandwiched," you can find help. You could consider an Agency Account, where the elderly parent or you, as the sandwiched child, retain control as Trustee, POA or contact person for the parent or child and the Bank helps pay bills to free up time. Financial planning tools can also be useful in determining if acquired wealth will cover care and retirement expenses.

We recommend visiting with your qualified financial professional, attorney or CPA to discuss options available to the "sandwiched" generation.
