On the sabbath Jesus began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard Him were astounded. They said, 'Where did this man get all this? ... Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary?'

from Mark 6:2-3

Friends,

One of the most basic questions we can ask about Jesus is also one of the most difficult to answer. Who is Jesus? It was a puzzle, even to those who knew Him during His earthly life. His life and ministry resisted being pigeonholed into any one category. He may have been a carpenter, like Joseph before him, but Jesus must have given that career up when He began his ministry. And even as a religious man, He couldn't be counted as another Jewish priest because of His unorthodox ministry. Priests would rarely be seen wandering the countryside with an entourage of disciples, friends and followers. And no priest would ever be seen hanging out with known sinners and non-Jews like Jesus would.

Throughout the New Testament, writers said that Jesus took on many roles, but most of these were metaphorical images. Yes, Jesus was called God's judge, but not the sort of arrogant and corrupt judge that Palestinians had come to expect. Jesus was called a servant and even a slave, but there's no record of Him serving any employer or belonging to anyone but God. And of course Jesus called Himself a Good Shepherd (John 10), but there's no Biblical record of Jesus ever owning a sheep or taking care of anyone else's sheep.

To confuse matters even more, Jesus used similarly poetic imagery to describe Himself, not as a man, but as objects or even as concepts. He called Himself bread (John 6), a door (John 10:7-9) and a vine (John 15:1-5). He called Himself the Light of the World (John 8:12), the Resurrection (John 11:25), the Way, the Truth and the Life (John 14:6).

So what are we to do when we can't figure out who or what someone is? Well, we start by learning as much about them as we can. As we worship during the season of Lent, we'll be looking at many of the roles that Jesus was labeled with, or claimed Himself. About how the Son of God can be a servant, and how an itinerant preacher and miracle worker could be a judge. About how the King of Heaven looked like a servant and how God incarnate could seem to be a fool. And in all this, I hope that we'll find what Jesus can be for us in our own lives, and the lives of the people around us. Because, as with any of the people in our lives, sometimes the answer to "Who are you?" may depend very much on who we believe WE are. And a lot of the time, the correct answer may be the simplest.

Jesus asked them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Peter answered Him, 'You are the Messiah.'

Happy St. Patrick's Day!

Every March 17, countries around the world celebrate St. Patrick's Day in observance of the death of St. Patrick, the patron saint of <u>Ireland</u> credited for bringing <u>Christianity to the country</u>. Initially a religious feast day in the 17th century, St. Patrick's Day has evolved into a day of celebrating Irish culture with parades, music, dancing, special foods, and of course, a lot of green.

In honor of St. Patrick's Day, here are a few interesting St. Patrick's Day facts!

- Saint Patrick didn't wear green. His color was "Saint Patrick's blue." The color green became associated with St. Patrick's Day after it was linked to the Irish independence movement in the late 18th century. Despite his Irish notoriety, Saint Patrick was British. He was born to Ro-
- man parents in <u>Scotland</u> or Wales in the late fourth century.
 According to Irish legend, Saint Patrick used the shamrock as a metaphor for the Holy Trinity when he was first introducing Christianity to Ireland.
- Saint Patrick is credited for driving the snakes out of Ireland, but according to the fossil record, Ireland has never been home to snakes as it was too cold to host reptiles during the Ice Age. The surrounding seas have kept snakes out since.

• There isn't any corn in the traditional St. Patrick's Day meal of corned beef and cabbage. The name is a reference to the large grains of salt historically used to cure meats, which were also known as "corns."

• Saint Patrick was born "Maewyn Succat" but changed his name to "Patricius" after becoming a priest.

Irish immigrants began observing St. Patrick's Day in <u>Boston</u> in 1737 and the first St. Patrick's Day parade in America was held in <u>New York City</u> in 1766.

In <u>Chicago</u>, the Plumbers Local 110 union dyes the river Kelly green. The dye lasts for around five hours.

On or around St. Patrick's Day, the Irish taoiseach, or prime minister, presents the U.S. president with a crystal bowl of live shamrocks as a symbol of the close ties between the two countries.
